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# Green Alliance: Recreating Green World

In an article published in the Indian Express on 1 January 2018, Ramchandra Guha – one of India's most reputed historians - pointed out that as we enter the new year, environmental sustainability is the second biggest challenge that India presently faces (the first being communal harmony). "Our forests are threatened with invasive weeds and declining biodiversity. Our cities have the highest rates of air pollution in the world. Our rivers are badly polluted too and groundwater aquifers are depleting rapidly. The chemical contamination of our soils is colossal. These multiple environmental crises threaten our economic future. and perhaps our civilizational future as well." wrote Guha.

One of the responses of the Don Bosco Society to the environmental crisis has been the launching of Green Line. Green Line, founded in 2010, is a Don Bosco environmental organization based in Mumbai. Green Line does not focus on any single environmental problem, rather, it focuses on the source of the problem – people! While its vision is 'Greener People, Greener World', its people mission is 'Getting informed. interested and involved in environmental issues'. To fulfil this vision and mission, Green presently runs three flagship Line programmes in the city of Mumbai.

The first programme, Green Schools Campaign, is focused on educating young minds on their responsibility towards the environment. This Campaign took off in 2010 with 12 participating schools and that number has now grown to over 50 schools.

Our second programme, called Green Lead Volunteers, is a programme for college or university students and works towards building future environmental leaders. Green Lead offers youngsters the perfect opportunity and platform by involving them in a variety of relevant on-going environmental issues.

The third programme promoted by Green Line is the Green Lifestyle Initiative. With environmental consciousness growing, individuals, families, housing societies and locality groups are increasingly looking for ways in which they can contribute towards the green movement.

It has been rewarding over these past eight years to see a steady build up of interest and commitment towards the environment among the people that Green Line has been working with. Yes, these may only be slow and small steps, but mindset, attitude and lifestyle changes don't happen in a hurry. But then again, changing people is the only way to change the present situation... it's only when we have greener people, will we have a greener world. And that, as I said earlier, is the vision of Greenline!

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# Launching High Success Rate, Techno-Innovative Adult Literacy Model in Eight Indian States

BOSCONET, all set to impart reading, writing and functional mathematical skill to 73,500 illiterates in just 50 hours

The first phase of a three year TCS-Computer-Based Functional Literacy Programme, a unique techno-innovative model, would be launched by BOSCONET in March 2018 across Maharashtra, Gujarat, West Bengal, Bihar, Goa, Karnataka, Andhra Pradesh and Telangana . After successful implementation and lessons derived from its previous three year- pilot project (VEMBU of Tiruchi Province) in four districts of Tamil Nadu, BOSCONET is now extending the programme into additional areas in North India

The core objective of the programme is to train 73,500 illiterates to read, write and do simple arithmetic to enable them to aspire for better paid jobs and enjoy better quality of life across human development indicators; the vision and strategy is to increase access to, starting with functional literacy, leading to financial and digital literacy without which it would be too challenging to gainfully navigate our Knowledge based economy.

### High Success Rate, Techno- innovation: TCS-Computer-Based Functional Literacy:

This computer based functional literacy programme (CBFL) developed by Tata Consultancy Services (TCS) successfully imparts verifiable reading competencies to the learners in approximate batch period of 50 hours, finely moulded into their daily routine without causing disturbance to their routine schedule of work. The above proposed programme uses 120 trained, graduate facilitators to initiate the learning process, with not more than 28 beneficiary under a facilitator at one point of time. This IT enabled methodology allows for standardisation of the quality of training rather than it being a mere function of the capability of the teacher.

The adult friendly curriculum and its immediate linkage with employment rights, strikes an instant chord with the learners and attracts consistent attendance during literacy classes and thus triggering sense of survival necessity, opportunity and momentum among the learners to master the skills.

### Through Words to Alphabets: The Reverse Method

The difference in the training strategy adopted in CBFL is that it directly introduces the learners to day to day useful words, thereby teaching simultaneously the letters used in those words.



The traditional method focuses on alphabets first and proceeds to introduce words.

The validated outcomes and benefits enjoyed by trainees include ability to read a newspaper, fill application forms, read bulletins and notice boards at bus and railway stations and correspond with family and friends.

### Meeting the Beneficiaries and Facilitators:

Velimela Kalavathy, a 35-year-old resident of Marxist Nagar Colony, a shabby settlement in Medak district, Andhra Pradesh, says "Reading newspapers, signing documents, helping my children with their homework, even boarding the right bus - these were things I couldn't do previously. Now I can do all of this and a lot more. I feel empowered with self-respect."

Rupa kumari, 30, she has taught, as a facilitator, CBFL literacy classes to over 20 batches of ladies. "Being able to impart reading skills ... is an empowering experience, because you see the results as early as within 12 weeks," she says. Rupa helped form a women's self-help group in her local village. This group now operates local government contracts in the district, and Rupa and her partners have seen their income grow.

### BOSCONET, COMMITTED TO THE MANDATE.....

BOSCONET, today, stands at the threshold of a renewed human reengineering endeavour, to lead India and the Asian region towards an equity based, outcome – transparent, inclusive growth of the most excluded, neglected and marginalised groups. CBFL adult literacy is just a part of its larger vision and mandate to contribute to the macro sustainable development and reform agenda in the region. Training of 73500 illiterates in functional literacy in these seven States is only a beginning of a lifelong empowering process and BOSCONET looks upto the pioneering spirit of TATA, its talented personnel at TCS for their continued support and guidance for holistic implementation of the programme.





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## **GIFTING THEM THE LIGHT OF LEARNING**

Educational Sponsorship for Children of Migrant Families in Delhi



"All it takes is one pen and one book to change the world" says Nobel Laureate Malala Yousafzai. On the 26th of January 2018, a team from Bosconet visited the Don Bosco School Alaknanda, New Delhi, to initiate 30 migrant children into a life of secured education.

The program began with a word of introduction by Fr. Nobert, mentor to the huge crowd of migrants under his care in Delhi. ' Only education can lift you out of this situation into greater heights' were the words which instilled greater thirst to learn among the 30 young minds who listened to him eagerly. Fr. Noel Maddhichetty, Director, Bosconet, reaffirmed the same, taking the example of Don Bosco, who lived, worked and ultimately gave up his life for the betterment of children and youth like them. Post the session of inaugural address, Fr. Nobert took the opportunity to reveal to the students and their families the aid being presented to the beneficiaries in the form of solar lamps, foldable tables and chairs and school bags. He explained the functioning of the solar lamp to the families, elaborating that now the education of the beneficiaries need not suffer due to lack of electricity and necessary infrastructure to study at home. The program concluded with refreshments for the beneficiaries and their families.

Apart from our yearly activities, Bosconet is currently implementing 4 distinct Corporate Social Responsibility (CSR) projects benefiting hundreds of vulnerable people in need.

Youth Skill Training and Improved Livelihood Project	TM International Logistics Limited has joined hands with Don Bose technical school, Liluah, Kolkata in imparting skill training programm to 60 youth and providing them with job placement service to empow them both socially and economically.		
Placement Linked Skill Development of Rural and Tribal Men and Women	Under the second CSR project, Price Water Cooper (PwC) sponsored Don Bosco Self-Employment Institute, Mirpara, West Bengal, to provide 100 tribal and rural men and women competency-based skill training, who will later be placed in suitable employment pertaining to there training.		
Special Education Programme for Slum Children and Women	125 underprivileged children coming from neighbouring slums are provided special educational based support – Evening tuition classes by the Don Bosco Development centre in West Bengal as part of the third CSR project. Funded by TM International Logistics Limited, these children are provided with a healthy and holistic environment where they can be prevented to drop out from schools, flourish as individual and become self-sustained contributing Indian citizen.		
Community Environment Awareness and Orchard Development	As climate change has been a growing concern in the national and international political discourses, UPS Foundation Mumbai sponsored Bosconet, who along with its partner organisation, Pope John's Garden and SURABI Chennai, have collaborated to initiate an environment awareness campaign for youth and create an orchard with 1,200 fruit trees in Madhavaram Chennai. These orchards will then be used to improve the nutritional status of the people living with leprosy and HIV/AIDS.		

Bosconet thanks all its partners and well-wishers to make such initiative turn into reality and to enable us to make a direct difference in the lives of the people who most need it.
